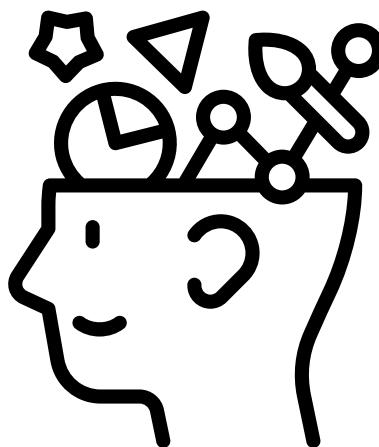
## 2026 Full-time TAFE, Applications now open

**Collaborator** - valuing teamwork, listening to others, and working respectfully.

**Creative** - using imagination and critical thinking to explore new ideas.

**Communicator** - expressing thoughts clearly and listening actively.

**Integrity** - acting honestly, fairly, and taking responsibility for actions.

**Risk-Taker** - approaching challenges bravely, learning from mistakes

**Reflective** - reflecting on strengths and next steps.

### Why These Values Matter

These values help children become not only successful learners but also capable contributors to their communities. When students understand themselves as learners through their strengths, needs and interests, they can take greater ownership of their learning journey

### How Parents Can Support at Home

You play a vital role in modelling and encouraging these dispositions.

Some simple ways to reinforce them include:

Caring: Encourage kindness at home by noticing and praising acts of empathy.

Independent: Give children small responsibilities, such as packing their own school bag.

Inquirer: Nurture curiosity by exploring answers together, rather than just giving them.

Resilient: Praise effort and persistence, not just results.

Reflective: Ask your child, "What did you learn today, and what would you do differently next time?"

Together, we can continue to grow students who are not only knowledgeable but also caring, resilient and ready to make a positive difference in the world.

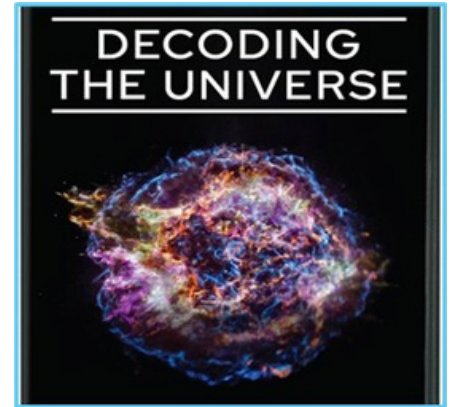
# What's happening around the School

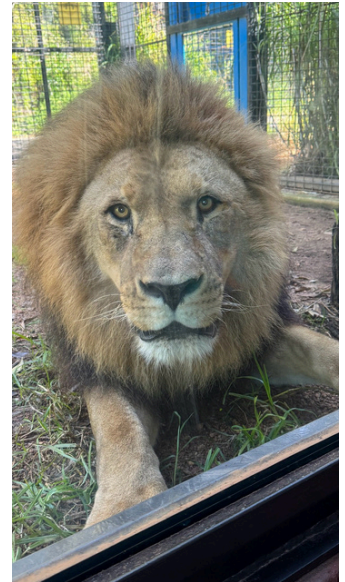

While there, the students attended a talk in Camp N'Dutu in the African Savannah, or Bukit Station in the Asian Rainforest.

Students experienced life as a ranger, observing and researching animals in their habitats. They learnt about a variety of factors that threaten animal survival, such as poaching, drought, farming, and disease. They also found out about how humans make a difference through conservation and education.

The students and staff thoroughly enjoyed their day at the zoo and are ready to use their new knowledge to begin learning about the natural world around them.

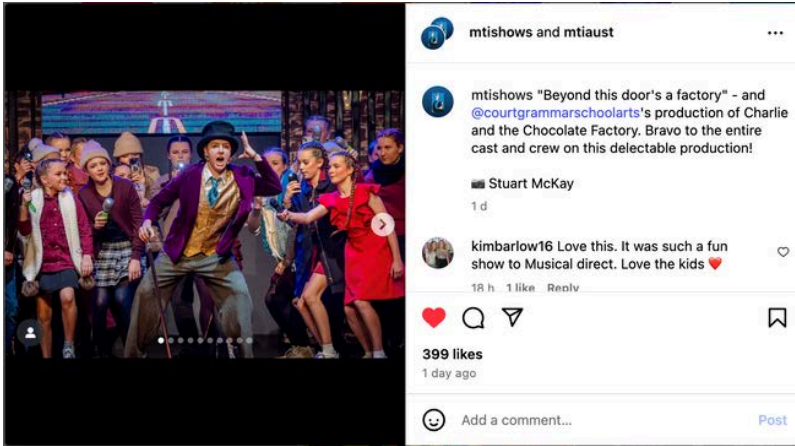

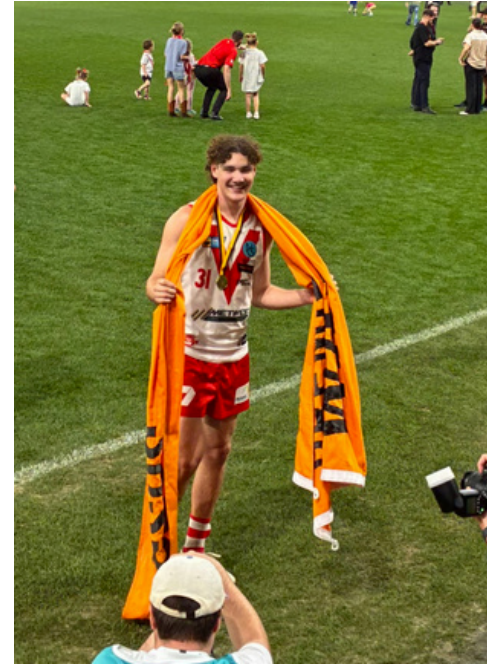
## Past Student Achievements

# Y10 Outdoor Ed Bouldering Excursion - Student Review

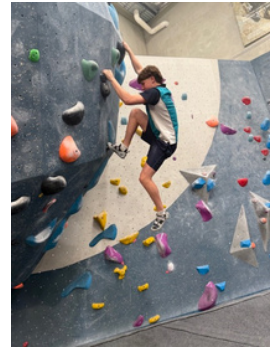
## What We Did

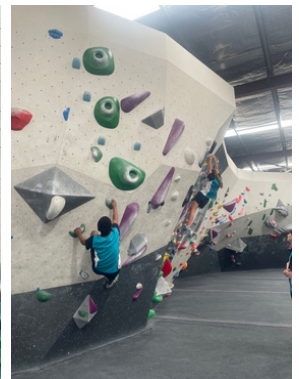
## What We Enjoyed

# Year 8 - Sydney and Canberra Camp - Mrs Joy

From Friday 8 to Friday 15 August, Year 8 students at Court Grammar School embarked on an exciting educational tour of Sydney and Canberra. This camp offered students the chance to experience some of Australia's most significant cultural, historical and political landmarks, while also strengthening friendships and resilience along the way.

## Sydney Highlights

Our journey began in Sydney, where students explored some of the city's most iconic attractions, including Taronga Zoo, the Sydney Opera House, Sydney Harbour Bridge, Paddy's Market and the Sydney Tower Eye. These visits provided students with cultural insights and unforgettable memories before continuing to Canberra.



## Civics and Citizenship in Canberra

A major focus of the trip was the Civics and Citizenship education program. Students visited key national institutions that deepened their understanding of Australian democracy, culture, and heritage.

Highlights included:

- Australian War Memorial & Anzac Parade - A deeply moving experience where students reflected on our national history. A special moment came when the group heard the story of John Hill, an uncle of one of our students, and saw his name honoured on the Roll of Honour.
- Parliament House - Students were given a guided tour, sitting in both the Senate Chamber and House of Representatives. They also participated in a lively role play that gave them a real sense of how Australia is governed.
- National Electoral Education Centre - Hands-on workshops helped students understand the voting system and its importance to democratic participation.
- Museum of Australian Democracy (Old Parliament House) - Students explored the evolution of Australian politics and leadership in an interactive environment.



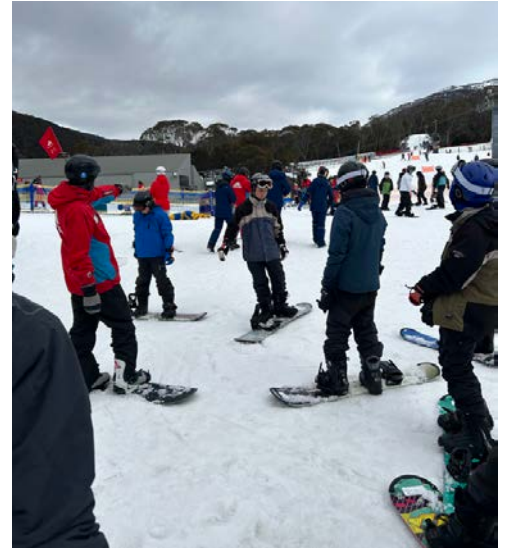
The Australian Government recognises the importance of these experiences, and through the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER) program, contributed \$510 per student to help offset costs for families.

- Australian National Botanical Gardens
- Reconciliation Place and the International Flag Display
- Australians of the Year Walk
- National Arboretum
- Cockington Green Gardens
- Australian Institute of Sport
- An evening at iPlay and the movies



The camp also included two days in the snow, with snow play at Perisher and a full day of skiing or snowboarding at Thredbo. For many students, this was a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

The final day concluded with breathtaking views from Mount Ainslie Lookout, followed by a visit to the National Capital Exhibition, where students learned about the design and history of Canberra itself.

## Reflections

This camp was more than just a trip — it was an opportunity for students to connect with the heart of Australia's democracy, to see history come alive, and to develop a deeper sense of belonging to the nation they are part of. It was also a chance to share new experiences, from the snowfields to national landmarks, strengthening bonds with peers and teachers alike.

We are incredibly proud of the way our Year 8 students represented Court Grammar School and grateful to the staff, families and the Australian Government for making this experience possible.
