Semester Reports

Our semester reports will be sent out at the end of this school term, the week after the students have left the school for this academic year. For this year, the structure of our Semester Two report presents the same as our Semester One report; however, there may be a difference in the assessment of concepts, understandings, skills and dispositions.



Please note that students have been assessed on a combination of ongoing assessment, formal assessments and teacher judgement over the semester. Students are assessed on what has been taught. This means that it is quite likely for a child to demonstrate 'A' standard in a particular area in Semester 1; however, they may demonstrate 'C' standard in Semester 2. This does not mean that the student is not progressing or has regressed. Rather, it means that in one specific concept and at one point in the year, the child's understanding was excellent in the areas being explored. However, later in the year, with different concepts, skills, etc., the child's understanding was assessed as being satisfactory for the areas being explored. Please note: students who are on an Individual Education Plan may have part or all of their report modified based upon the goals in the individual plan. This will have been discussed between parents, caregivers and teachers before the report is issued.

Kindergarten Semester 2 Reports

Our Kindergarten report provides a clear snapshot of your child's learning and development across the year. The report is organised into the key curriculum areas of English, Fine and Gross Motor Skills, Mathematics and Personal and Social Development, each presented through specific 'I can...' statements that describe the skills and behaviours your child is demonstrating.

These statements are drawn directly from the Western Australian Kindergarten Curriculum Guidelines, ensuring consistency and clarity. Your child's progress in each area is indicated using a five-point achievement scale: Excellent, High, Satisfactory, Limited or Very Low achievement. A general comment from the classroom teacher accompanies the table, providing a personalised overview of your child's engagement, confidence and growth throughout the semester. Together, these components offer a comprehensive picture of both academic progress and early developmental milestones.

What's happening around the School

Bibbulmun Track achievement - Faith Year 5

This year Faith and her Dad Jamie completed a Continuous End-to-End of the Bibbulmun Track. Rich in history, the track runs from the coast in Albany to the hills in Kalamunda (approximately a 1000km), following much of Western Australia's abandoned railroads and passing through many historical mining and logging towns. The track also passes through one of the world's 36 Biodiversity Hot Spots.

It took Faith (and her Dad) 67 days to complete their trip, walking hut to hut and hopping off at towns along the way to restock their food supplies and have a shower! They also had to double back to complete two sections that closed after a bushfire passed through.



Faith was just 5 years old when she completed her first three day walk on the Bibbulmun Track. Back then it took her all day to walk 11km with a 2kg backpack. This time however she would be carrying up to 8kg in her backpack and on some days, travel more than 25 kilometres by foot over what can be at times, very rugged terrain.

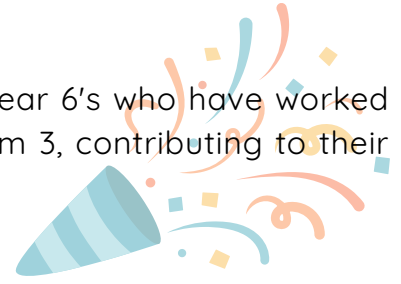
It was an extraordinary accomplishment for a 10 year old and we are incredibly proud of her.

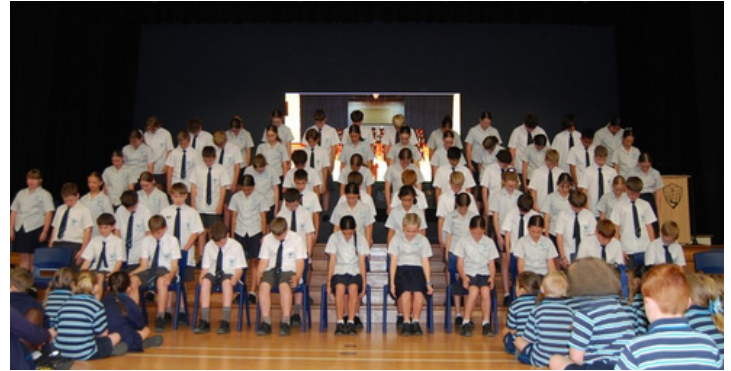


Some background understanding - what is Tutting?

Tutting is precise and controlled movements that focuses on creating geometrical shapes and angles using the arms, hands, and fingers.

Movements are performed with crisp, sharp, and clean lines, often forming right angles, symmetrical patterns, and box-like positions.

Police Rangers - Mr Krokosz

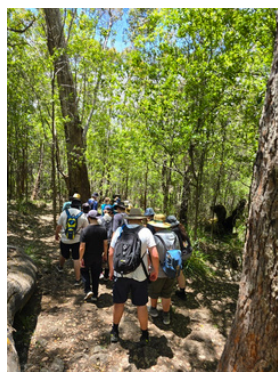

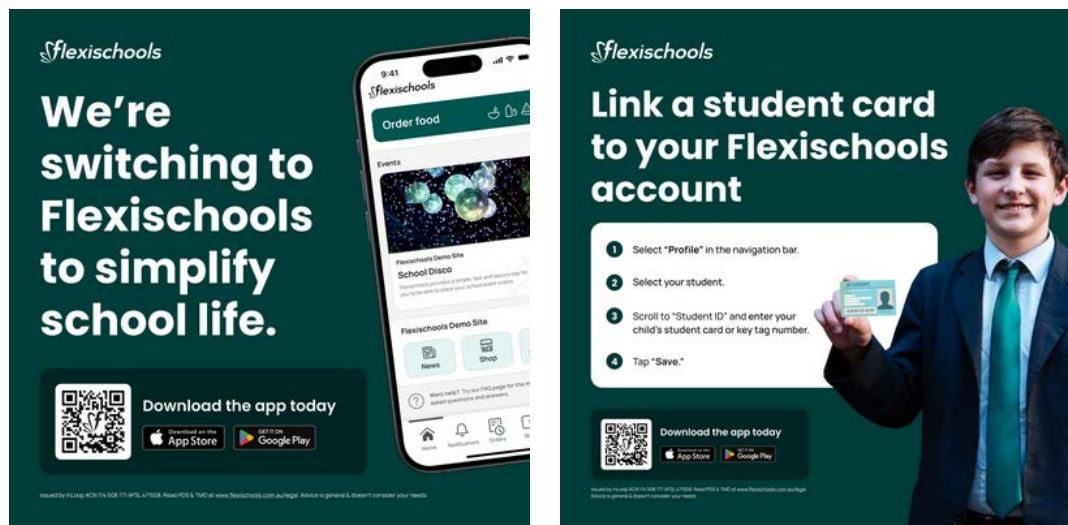
